History in support of memory

The death of Jacques Chirac in September of 2019 was a timely moment to remember that he was the first French president to recognize the responsibility of the French government in the persecution and deportation of French Jews. This recognition took place at the commemoration of the Vel d'Hiv Roundup in July 1995. Positioning his speech within the long timeframe of history rather than the current political context, his words marked a decisive turning point, which would lead to the creation of the Commission for the Compensation of Victims of Spoliations (Commission d'Indemnisation des Victimes de Spoliations, CIVS) and of the Foundation for the Memory of the Shoah.

We obviously always feel gratified when the authorities adopt the conclusions of researchers and of remembrance projects. The Foundation is proud of its support for research in this field, which further expands our knowledge about one of the darkest periods in our history, that of the French Occupation and the Shoah.

As a result of the combined efforts of witnesses, historians and memory associations, undertaken since the 1970s, the fate suffered by Jews during World War II has become well known to the public at large. But 75 years after the end of the war, this "era of the witness," a term coined by the historian Annette Wieviorka, is coming to an end: there is now no more than a handful of people who can still provide first-hand knowledge of the horror of the Shoah through their personal experiences. With the baton passing to the younger generation, they can become vigilant sentinels combating hatred of the other, which we now know can lead to the extermination of innocent men, women and children.

As the last Shoah survivors leave us, one fter the other, and as COVID-19 has taken a heavy toll on this population, the Foundation has made it a priority to ensure that all these former deportees and hidden children live out their lives in the best possible conditions. This is one of the fundamental reasons for our existence, as well as a moral obligation.

Continued support for others despite the obstacles

During a strategic seminar held in November of 2019, discussions on the Foundation's policy priorities, which have been ongoing for several years, produced positive results. While the original missions were reaffirmed, greater focus was given to two sectors, whose situation worsened further with the Covid pandemic. that warrant particular attention: aid to Shoah survivors, which is crucial to supporting them in extreme old age, and the safety and security of the Jewish community, which has seen a surge in anti-Semitic attacks, both in public spaces and on social media.

Alongside this reassessment of priorities, we cannot lose sight of the fact that the Foundation continues to pursue its overall goals as the context becomes increasingly difficult. The sustained drop in financial yields will inevitably impact our institution's ability to act on a relatively longterm basis. In 2017, we therefore began a gradual, targeted reduction in our commitments. Our goal is to limit the effects of a drastic drop in our revenue, which could jeopardize many projects—revenue on which stakeholders depend. The figures in this report therefore reflect this trend, with a slight decrease in the number of projects supported, both in terms of actual numbers and funds provided.

Nevertheless, the Foundation is still fully committed to its areas of activities and is determined to remain an active participant, contributing to the education of children, the fight against anti-Semitism, the transmission of the memory of the Shoah, furthering vital research, the expansion of Jewish culture and support for survivors—which is more essential than ever during a pandemic. To meet these challenges, it can count on the volunteer members in the institution and its staff, to whom I would like to extend my warmest thanks.

Foundation for the Memory of the Shoah

The Foundation for the Memory of the Shoah was created in 2000 in recognition of the French government's responsibility in the Shoah.

The FMS is a private and public-interest foundation. The initial endowment of €393 million came from the restitution by the government and certain financial institutions of dormant accounts from expropriated Jews living in France who were killed during the Holocaust.

With the funds generated by this endowment, the Foundation subsidizes the Shoah Memorial and supports projects that help to expand knowledge about the Shoah, provide assistance to survivors in need, encourage the transmission of Jewish culture and combat anti-Semitism by facilitating intercultural dialogue.

Nearly 4,700 projects financed


Since its creation, the Foundation for the Memory of the Shoah has financed nearly 4,700 projects.

All projects submitted to the Foundation are evaluated independently, then examined by six thematic committees (History of Anti-Semitism and the Shoah, Memory and Transmission, Shoah Education, Jewish Culture, Solidarity, and Combating Anti-Semitism and Supporting Intercultural Dialogue) made up of volunteer experts.

Projects recommended by the committees are submitted to the Foundation's Executive Board and the Board of Directors, which determine which projects will be supported as well as the assistance to be provided. The Financial Committee, chaired by a magistrate from the French Court of Auditors, ensures the preservation of the endowment and monitors the use of funds.



• Number of projects handled by the Foundation





More than €20 million allocated in 2019

Nearly €11 million went to 304 projects in 2019, representing 54 percent of the Foundation's funding budget (see details on pp. 6 and 7).

The Foundation is also the primary funding source for the Shoah Memorial. It covers nearly two-thirds of its budget. The FMS fully finances the Drancy site and supports the renovation and expansion projects at the Memorial in Paris. Additional financing was provided for the program of educational trips and teacher training, coordinated by the Memorial.

In addition, the Foundation pursues a policy of keeping operating costs under control; in 2019, these represented 8.6 percent of its total budget (a slight decrease).

Shoah Memorial



In 2019, 31 researchers received grants or support for research. On the initiative of the History of Anti-Semitism and the Shoah


Committee, the Foundation also helped organize international conferences, including an initiative on children during wartime and the inflow of Jewish migrants. More than a dozen publications and translations were also funded in 2019.

Within the framework of its Memory and Transmission Committee, the Foundation has renewed its support for the activities of the Union of Auschwitz Deportees; for the recognition of actions by the Righteous, conducted by the French Committee for Yad Vashem; and for fieldwork for the memory of Jewish victims shot in Poland, carried out by Yahad-In Unum. It cofinanced 18 films and 7 publications in 2019.

The Foundation directly funded 57 educational trips to sites of memory during the 2019-20 school year, but some 15 trips were canceled due to the health crisis. It also financed the teacher training program and educational trips coordinated by the Shoah Memorial. This represents approximately half of the funding allocated for Shoah Education.

For Jewish Culture, the Foundation supported a major exhibition on the

painter Jules Adler at the Museum of Jewish Art and History, as well as several plays, films and other cultural events. It also places great importance on the training initiatives by several stakeholders (Alliance Israélite Universelle, Éclaireurs Israélites, Université populaire du judaïsme, etc.).

Concerning the Gordin Foundation (see p. 12), eight grants and loans were granted to Jewish schools to finance construction work in 2019.

As for Solidarity for Shoah survivors, the Foundation renewed its support for the Œuvre de Secours aux Enfants, notably for its outpatient centers, for Casip-Cojasor (social activities) and for Casim (home care in Marseille). In Israel, it continues to support several social programs.

Finally, the Foundation contribues to the Combat Against Anti-Semitism and the support of Intercultural Dialogue. In 2019, it reiterated its support for the Jewish Community Protection Service (Service de Protection de la Communauté Juive, SPCJ), LICRA and Conspiracy Watch.

The Shoah Memorial is the leading partner of the Foundation for the Memory of the Shoah. Thanks to permanent support from the Foundation, the Memorial has been able to develop and host an increasing number of visitors (individuals, school groups, researchers, etc.) and expand its activities relating to archival collections and training. The FMS supports the Memorial in its project to renovate and expand the Wall of Names, bearing the names of the 76,000 Jews deported from France, inaugurated in January 2020. The Shoah Memorial has an exceptional archival collection that is constantly growing and is available to researchers.

Since 2018, the CERCIL, Musée-Mémorial des Enfants

du Vél' d'Hiv' has been part of the Shoah Memorial. Through this new relationship, the two organizations have confirmed their shared goal of ensuring the continuity of the CERCIL's work in Orléans.

The Memorial is also an educational and training site recognized by the Ministry of National Education and the Interministerial Delegation to Combat Racism, Anti-Semitism and hatred for LGBTs. In addition to the many school groups it hosts, it organizes study trips to Shoah sites, develops educational workshops in schools and offers training sessions for teachers. Those working in other professions (police officers, judges, etc.) can also participate in specific training programs.

In conjunction with its permanent exhibition, the Memorial presented a temporary exhibition in 2019 entitled "The Art Market Under the Occupation," based on the eponymous book by Emmanuelle Polack, who received support from

the FMS for her research. It also organized two thematic exhibitions: "The Internment of Nomads, A French History (1940–1946)" and a second one in conjunction with the special program focusing on the 25th anniversary of the Rwanda genocide against the Tutsi. Alongside these exhibitions, the Memorial offers an excellent, wide-ranging cultural program (films, lectures, conferences).

Institutional partnerships

The Foundation for the Memory of the Shoah supports the three major federative institutions of French Judaism—the Unified Jewish Social Fund (Fonds Social Juif Unifié, FSJU), the Representative Council of French Jewish Institutions (Conseil Représentatif des Institutions Juives de France, CRIF) and the Central Consistory (Consistoire Central)—as part of a multiannual project framework.

The joint initiative with the FSJU includes both social and cultural aspects (notably the online Akadem campus). The initiative with the CRIF focuses on the particular issue of combating anti-Semitism. Finally, the initiative with the Consistory deals with education, the development of programs for youth and the improvement of rabbinical training.

In addition, the Foundation is one of the main contributors to the Jewish Community Protection Service (Service de Protection de la Communauté Juive, SPCJ), which, in close cooperation with public authorities, oversees security in Jewish schools, religious sites and community institutions.

The FMS is a partner in the National Competition on the Resistance and Deportation (Concours National de la Résistance et de la Déportation, CNRD), along with the Ministry of National Education, the Ministry of Armed Forces and four other major foundations that focus on the memory of World War II.

The Foundation is part of the International Holocaust Remembrance Alliance (IHRA). This organization promotes research, education and memorial initiatives concerning the Shoah.

The Foundation for the Memory of the Shoah is a member of the French Foundation Center.

The Gordin Foundation for school buildings

The Rachel and Jacob Gordin Foundation was created in 2008 to help finance building projects for Jewish schools: acquisition of buildings, extensions, upgrading work to meet standards. Housed by the Foundation for the Memory of the Shoah, the Gordin Foundation brings together the FSJU, the Harevim Fund, the Rothschild Foundation, the Sacta-Rashi Foundation and the FMS. It supports Jewish schools by allocating grants and loans. A specific fund was created to help schools accommodate new students arriving from the public sector whose families are having difficulties paying school fees (see the list of projects supported in 2019, p. 47).

Support for research

The Foundation supports research on anti-Semitic persecution, the Shoah and other genocides. It also supports research in other disciplines such as literature, sociology, philosophy, art history, political science and the law. The Foundation awards doctoral and postdoctoral grants and finances research trips and conferences. It also contributes to the dissemination of knowledge via funding for publications and translations. Finally, it participates in the conservation and exploitation of archives.

Through its system of grants and a biannual seminar for grantholders, the Foundation for the Memory of the Shoah participates in the construction of a particularly active, informal research network. Three new views on the persecution of the Jews

In Convois. La déportation des juifs de France, Jean-Luc Pinol presents a series of maps, providing an overview of deported Jews, based on Serge Klarsfeld's Mémorial de la Déportation des Juifs de France. The granular approach using maps and their immediate visual impact provide a new way of interpreting the arrests and deportations, underscoring the dramatic situations. The maps instantly show that no region of France was spared, and that the entire country became a gigantic trap for persecuted Jews. With maps that illustrate both history and geography, it is possible to "see in space and time the scope of the persecution, as well as the individual and collective fates of thousands of families."

Où sont les bibliothèques spoliées par les nazis? (ed. Martine Poulain) and Commando Musik (Willem de Vries) relate two stories of spoliation that are less well known than that of paintings and works of art, but iust as widespread and systematic: books and musical instruments. We know that all Jewish property was plundered, but these two books examine the extent of the phenomenon in terms of objects, books and instruments. The owners' highly personal and often deep connection to these objects, an intimate attachment, made their loss even more cruel. An estimated 5 million books were pillaged. As for musical instruments and musical scores, several hundreds of thousands were ripped from the hands of the men and women who played them.



Bringing memory to life

Remembering the history of the Shoah and its implications is a priority for the Foundation for the Memory of the Shoah. It therefore supports memorial initiatives (commemorations, plaques, memorial stones) and projects that transmit this history, including those that illuminate little-known aspects. These include books, films, exhibitions and plays. The Foundation also accompanies most of the major museum projects concerning internment, deportation and the rescue of Jews in France.

The Foundation contributes to the conservation and transmission of witness accounts. Since 2004, the Foundation has been publishing a series of Shoah testimonies (see p. 28).

As the last witnesses are disappearing, the time has come to reexamine ways of transmitting the memory of the Shoah.

We must think about reaching a new public, through new media supports. The Foundation therefore supported the podcast "A la recherché de Jeanne," which deals with the persecution of Jews during the war through an audio investigation by the journalist Zazie Tavitian, who set out to uncover the history of her great-greatgrandmother, Jeanne Weill, who died in Sobibor. Tavitian uses her ancestor's notebook of recipes as the starting point for telling her story. The podcast won both public and critical acclaim, confirming that an individual story, when told in an original way, is a compelling way to transmit the memory of the Shoah."

Children and the Shoah

That the Nazi project aimed to exterminate even the smallest children along with the entire Jewish population reveals its utter monstrosity. The Foundation therefore pays particular attention to projects that perpetuate the memory of the youngest victims of the Shoah.

In 2019, two commemorations came as a reminder of the role played by the Children's Homes in saving Jewish children during the war, followed by physical and psychological support to rebuild their lives after 1945. At Mesnil-le-Roi and Les Andélys, highly emotional ceremonies included the placement of a commemorative plaque that recalled the fate of these particular places, where hundreds of children, many of them orphans, rediscovered a little joy in their lives.

Similarly, encouraging the transmission

of the Shoah among younger generations is an ongoing concern, which warrants support for films dealing with the fate of children to whom today's children can identify (1945, la République des enfants perdus by Frédéric Tonolli), and others that document encounters—in as much as is still possible—between Shoah survivors and children born after 2000 (Une vie nous sépare by Baptiste Antignani and Raphaëlle Gosse-Gardet, Les gamins de Ménilmontant by Pascal Auffray and Antarès Bassis).

This was also the reasoning behind the Foundation's support for the book Si je reviens un jour ... by Stéphanie Trouillard and Thibaut Lambert, based on the rediscovered letters of Louise Pikovsky, a brilliant high-school student in Paris whose life was cut short by the Shoah.

"Testimonies of the Shoah" series

The "Testimonies of the Shoah" series publishes the accounts of Jews persecuted by the Nazis and their collaborators. Whether they were deported, interned or hidden during the war, the authors recount their personal experiences, shedding additional light on the various aspects of the unprecedented crime of the Shoah. The series also includes accounts from Resistance members and those who worked to save Jews. It provides the public with texts that have not been published before or that have become unavailable. This year, our special thoughts go out to Roger Fichtenberg, a major figure of the Resistance, and Anna Traube, who survived the Vel d'Hiv Roundup. Both contributed their stories to the series and both died in 2019.

Each testimony is examined by a reading committee chaired by Serge Klarsfeld that includes Shoah witnesses and historians.

Published by Le Manuscrit, the testimonies are available in bookstores and on the Internet, in paper or digital format. The series now has more than 90 works.

NICOLAS ROSENTHAL



Born to a German Jewish family, Nicolas Rosenthal was sent to France in 1938 just before turning fourteen. Separated from his family, he began an apprenticeship, then

worked very hard on farms in Normandy and the Beauce region.

In October 1940, the Rosenthal family was brutally evicted from Germany and interned in camps in unoccupied France. In July 1942, Nicolas crossed the Demarcation Line illegally to join his relatives. With them, he was deported in September 1942. The only surviving member of his family, he was one of thirteen survivors from this convoy of one thousand people.

NATHAN AND MAURICETTE AUXE



Nathan and Mauricette, hidden children during the war, both escaped the genocide perpetuated by the Nazis.

Nathan was born in 1928 in Poland to a large family.

In October 1942, Nathan's parents, his four sisters and his grandmother were deported and assassinated in Treblinka. With his two older brothers, Nathan wandered from town to town and managed to remain hidden until the Red Army arrived, in January of 1945.

Mauricette was born in France in 1935. Living in Bagnolet until July 1942, she and her older sister were hidden by the Assistance Publique in Paris, then in a Catholic orphanage south of the capital. Arrested by the French police, Mauricette's father and maternal grandfather were deported and assassinated in Auschwitz II-Birkenau.

Several years after the war, their lives crossed paths in Paris, and together, they began a family—sweet revenge for the fate that seemed to have been awaiting them.

The life of a man

SAMUEL LEVI



Samuel Levi was born in Paris into a Sephardic family. His father, Élia, came from Turkey, and Sol, his mother, was born in Greece. During

the war, Samuel lived apart from his father, who had enlisted and was later imprisoned and deported to Auschwitz-Birkenau in May 1944.

In Paris, Samuel and his mother narrowly escaped the large roundup of stateless Jews in February 1943 thanks to a neighbor. With help from the Comité Amelot, Samuel was hidden in the Morvan, then sheltered until the end of the war on a farm in the Paris region. Wanted by the police, his mother was arrested in June 1944 and deported to Auschwitz.

Élia and Sol returned to France after the war, but did not live together. Samuel returned to school and earned a secondary school certificate, then began to work at the age of fourteen. Supporting himself with a variety of jobs, Samuel moved between France and Israel, before moving definitively to Paris in 1980 with his wife. With her, he was able to offer their children the stability and family love that had been stolen from him.

ÉLISABETH SENTUC



Élisabeth, whose family lived in Huedin in Transylvania, was among the 440,000 Jews deported from Hungary to Auschwitz during the spring and summer of 1944.

Twenty years old at the time, she never again saw her family.

Élisabeth's story of loss immerses the reader in family life within the Jewish community. Hungary's annexation of the region in 1940 compounded the persecutions of Jews. The Brodi family had already endured this situation before being interned in the Cluj ghetto, the last stop before deportation. The memory of her family, her strength of character and her endurance forged in the permanent danger of a horrible year—but one with fortunate encounters—gave her the resilience to endure this ordeal.

For her new life, she chose France, where she joined the man she loved. They met during an Allied bombing raid, in a shelter in Görlitz (Lower Silesia). They were married in La Teste-de-Buch, where they built a beautiful large family (8 children, 17 grandchildren), a triumph in the face of the annihilation organized by Hitler.

The ashes of memory

Ida Palombo



Born in Marseille in 1924 to a Jewish family that arrived from Thessaloniki (Greece) at the turn of the century,

Ida led a carefree youth until it was destroyed by World War II. Denounced and arrested by French militiamen on May 9, 1944, along with some of her family members, she was interned at Drancy, then deported to Auschwitz-Birkenau in convoy no. 74. In December 1944, she was transferred to the Sudetenland to work in a Mazda lightbulb factory. She managed to escape on May 9, 1945. Looked after by French prisoners of war, she was repatriated and given shelter at the Lutetia hotel in Paris.

This book relates her story, that of a strong, brave woman, transcribed from multiple audio recordings.

Bearing witness and sharing have been the driving forces of her life so that the ashes of memory are not scattered to the wind.

Teaching the history of the Shoah

The Foundation encourages the transmission of the history of the Shoah to schoolchildren.

It supports educational initiatives and the organization of training sessions for professors. As a partner of the National Competition on the Resistance and Deportation (CNRD), it participates in the creation of educational resources. The Foundation finances, directly or via the Shoah Memorial, many school trips to remembrance sites in France and throughout Europe. Special attention is paid to the preparation of these trips and to the reports and work done afterward.

From its creation, nearly twenty years ago, the Foundation has been supporting educational projects for schoolchildren. I would like to take this opportunity to commend the remarkable personal investment and commitment of the many teachers who have participated, always with the goal of transmitting an understanding of the Shoah to the young people under their tutelage. While maintaining historical rigor, they have been extremely creative in introducing suitable projects to their students, making the reality of the persecution and extermination of the Jews accessible to them through dialogues with survivors, historical and literary projects concerning witness accounts and the organization of school trips to Shoah memorial sites in France and in Europe. The quality of the work produced, notably after school trips, strengthens our belief that our support, essential for these trips, participates actively in the memory of the Shoah."

A workshop of the Teaching League around the memory of the Shoah and Jewish cultures

While the Shoah is included in school curriculums, it is primarily taught through the lens of the persecution and extermination of European Jews, leaving aside the cultural aspect for the most part. Hence the significance of the program proposed by the Ligue de l'Enseignement - Fédération de Paris to ten fifth-grade classes and to ten ninth-grade classes, to provide a more in-depth understanding of the history of Jewish communities.

The three-stage program is adapted to the students' level of comprehension: it begins with a guided tour of the Musée d'Art et d'Histoire du Judaïsme in Paris, which presents several iconic objects and works of art to help them discover the diversity of Jewish traditions and cultures (beliefs, celebrations, languages, schools of thought, etc.). The second stage takes them to the Shoah Memorial or to community centers run by the city of Paris, where the students discover klezmer, the music of the diaspora and a reflection of Jewish culture. The final stage, proposed to the ninth-graders, includes a study of the autobiographical texts of Hélène Berr, Simone Veil and Primo Levi.

At the end of the program, the students create art projects, on a given theme or of their own choosing, with the aim of commemorating the victims of the Shoah and of highlighting the wealth and diversity Jewish culture past and present. These works will then be showcased by the Ligue in exhibitions and on social media.

Since 2018, the Foundation has been supporting this program—which is full every year—run by the Ligue de l'Enseignement – Fédération de Paris.

Transmitting Jewish culture

From the very start, the Foundation has been committed to transmitting and making the best possible use of the thousand-year-old legacy of Judaism—entire segments of which were annihilated during the Shoah. The Foundation supports diverse aspects of Judaism, with a special emphasis on education, to ensure the transmission of Jewish culture from generation to generation. It thus supports training programs for teachers and directors of youth movements, as well as pedagogical projects for Jewish and Talmud Torah schools.

On a broader level, the Foundation also helps to promote Jewish culture in society at large by funding cultural events and series of classes and lectures for the general public. It is especially attuned to initiatives that promote Yiddish and Judeo-Spanish cultures and languages.

Finally, it supports Jewish studies through research grants and by encouraging the translation of important Jewish texts.

In 2019, the FMS and the Fondation Rothschild – Institut Alain de Rothschild decided to create a special fund to help small Jewish communities scattered around France and in the outer suburbs of Paris finance expenditures for repairs and major maintenance work on their buildings, as well as work required to bring their facilities up to code. In addition to preserving the properties, the goal is to ensure that these places important to Jewish life endure. These communities have deep roots in towns and villages, reflected in the historical contributions of major figures of French Judaism and a high-quality architectural heritage; they have helped Jewish culture thrive throughout the entire country. As centers for culture in the cities and for interreligious dialogue in a spirit of openness, they also contribute to the fight against anti-Semitism through a loyalty to their roots combined with a respect for republican values."



The mission of the European Institute of Jewish Music is to conserve and promote the Jewish musical heritage, past and present.

Preserving and promoting the Jewish musical heritage

The universal language of music is also an essential vehicle for transmitting Jewish culture. It is therefore no surprise that every year the Foundation is asked to support projects promoting the great diversity of Jewish music (klezmer, Hasidic, Yiddish, Jewish-Arab, Judeo-Spanish, religious and secular).

In 2019, we therefore renewed the funding provided for the last six years to the European Institute of Jewish Music (IEMJ), which plays a key role in conserving and promoting the Jewish musical heritage, by digitalizing several tens of thousands of audio and video recordings, scores, books, photographs and other archival material (concert posters, newspaper articles, etc.). The creation of a reference audio library is another of the IEMJ's missions, which provides the public at large with access to Jewish musical works from the past as well as the present.

Other musical news: the CD-book The Turkey Prince, an art project that presents an unusual translation of a tale by Rabbi Nachman of Breslov (an eighteenth-century Hasidic master), complete with songs, drawings and paintings by the artist Sandra Zemor. Another smaller publication was also funded in 2019: an annotated edition of a book of traditional Sabbath songs, designed especially for readers who do not speak Hebrew.

All of these projects, geared to either a large or small public, are in keeping with the Foundation's goal of promoting initiatives that strengthen the Jewish identity.



Solidarity toward Shoah survivors and those who suffered anti-Semitic persecution is one of the top priorities of the Foundation for the Memory of the Shoah.

The Foundation finances specific programs established by social

and medical institutions. These programs aim to meet the needs of Shoah survivors by offering targeted services: listening, guidance, psychological support, emergency financial assistance for people in need, home care services, support services for individuals with Alzheimer's and assisted-living residences. The Foundation also works to reduce the isolation of survivors by supporting associations that offer them group activities and cultural events. Today, approximately 3,000 Shoah survivors may benefit from these services.

Furthermore, the Foundation for the Memory of the Shoah provides assistance for survivors in Israel and Eastern Europe, particularly for those in the most critical situations, via programs set up by charitable organizations.

Time is running out, faster than ever, in context that the health crisis has made even more tragic. It is our duty to ensure that Shoah survivors receive the help they need. The mobilization of all our partners, both large and small associations, has been exemplary. They have had to respond, immediately, to new and urgent demands, first and foremost to those of Shoah survivors—notably by seeking to break the isolation imposed during the period of containment. We must continue our joint efforts and strengthen our partnership with the Claims Conference. It is determined effort which, aligned with the principles established by Board of Directors and its president, I share with my predecessors: I would like to take this opportunity to thank them, particularly Anne-Carole Bensadon.

Fostering social connections

Organized by the Foundation and the Claims Conference on December 23, 2019, during Hanukkah celebrations, a magnificent "survivors' party." complete with music, brought together some one hundred of them at the Casop-Cojasor Maison des Séniors in the 12th arrondissement of Paris. This International Holocaust Survivors' Night, which was also held in New York, Jerusalem, Munich, Sydney and Moscow, will certainly be repeated. The event was a reminder, if one were needed, of the importance of promoting initiatives that create social connections and give Shoah

survivors an opportunity to meet up together, thereby escaping the isolation that often accompanies old age.

In 2019, the Foundation also helped the Oeuvre de Secours aux Enfants to open an outpatient center for Alzheimer's patients in Strasbourg, where many Shoah survivors live. In addition to the services inherent in a structure of this type, designed to improve the quality of life of people suffering from neurodegenerative illness, this new center offers other specific activities (psychological support, theater, choir and art therapy workshops).



The International Holocaust Survivors Night brought together some 100 Shoah survivors on December 23, 2019. Karene Fredj and Éric de Rothschild, director and president of the Fondation Casip-Cojasor, and Haïm Korsia, Chief Rabbi of France, also attended.

Combating Anti-Semitism

The Foundation for the Memory of the Shoah supports the combat against anti-Semitism as well as initiatives that foster intercultural dialogue.

In conjunction with its teaching approach, the Foundation supports educational and citizen-based initiatives that specifically target prejudice and insidious moral equivalences. While the goal is to reach young people, the Foundation also supports events, publications and cultural productions geared to a wide public.

One of the committee's priorities is to develop initiatives aimed at

stemming the spread of hate speech on the Internet and on social media.


The virulence and violence of contemporary anti-Semitism have made security a particularly significant issue.

In order to identify and understand anti-Semitism and its recent developments, the committee supports research and monitoring in this area.

Finally, the Foundation funds initiatives working to foster intercultural dialogue and mutual understanding.

In 2019, there was a strong resurgence of anti-Semitic acts against people and property, both in the public sphere and on social media. Alongside the show of solidarity that spread through France and the Jewish community in response to the health crisis, this same context also reactivated the spread of more hate messages, notably using the figure of the Jew as a scapegoat, held responsible for the pandemic. The virulence of this incessant flow, combined with a fear of the virus, only bolsters our determination to fight against this widespread anti-Semitism, by supporting those who dissect, repudiate and squelch this irrational and dishonest rhetoric. This is a long-term task, which warrants sustained support for certain structures.

We therefore provide funding for programs that aim to debunk prejudices, which form the crucible of hatred specifically targeting the younger generation in diverse neighborhoods and in universities. This is an important part of our work, as we know that education is the only true way to foster dialogue and achieve an understanding and knowledge of the other."

Reaching a wider audience through films

One of the priorities in the fight against anti-Semitism involves deconstructing prejudices that are unfortunately deep-seated. To this end, and for once, the Foundation has decided to support made-for-TV documentary films to reach a large public.

The three audiovisual projects funded in 2019 each offer a complementary angle to the issue. In La rumeur d'Orléans, Stéphane Granzotto reexamines an event that occurred in 1969 and presents a highly convincing exposé of exactly how this rumor spread; the anti-Semitic message has persisted despite a total lack of proven facts. Histoire de l'antisémitisme, a four-part series by Laurent Jaoui and Jonathan Hayoun, produced by Arte, aims to provide an encyclopedic overview of anti-Semitism, which has remained ingrained in history, without any rational basis. As for Ilan Ziv's film, Antisémitismes, it presents a political analysis by drawing a parallel between the Dreyfus Affair and the assassination of Mireille Knoll in 2018.

In terms of combating anti-Semitic stereotypes, current events remind us nearly every day of the huge task ahead, which is even more reason to strengthen our initiatives in this area.

Rigorous hands-on management

Chaired by a magistrate from the Court of Auditors, the Financial Committee for the Foundation for the Memory of the Shoah works to maintain the value of the endowment and to make the best use of its revenue.

The Committee defines and closely monitors the investment strategy. The goal, which involves balancing risk management and financial performance, is to provide the Foundation with sufficient funds to meet current needs without compromising its ability to act in the future. The Foundation's staff ensures the daily management of the fund, with the support of qualified consultants. The Financial Committee also works to ensure good governance on the part of the Foundation. It monitors budgetary decisions and weighs in on the most important projects, notably those that entail a longterm commitment by the FMS. The Committee places particular importance on the assessment of these multiannual projects. It is also concerned with keeping a close watch on the Foundation's operating costs (8.6% of the 2019 budget).

Since the creation of the Foundation, more than €320 million have been allocated to some 4,700 projects.

In 2018, as markets continued to be increasingly unpredictable and interest rates remained low, we adopted a policy of gradually cutting back on expenditures to protect the endowment and the Foundation's capacity to act. While overall, 2019 recorded good results, these were negated by the impact of the health crisis that struck in 2020. Given these challenging conditions, the Foundation must exercise caution and creativity in its response to an unprecedented situation—the 2008 crisis was a far different context. The goal remains the same, even though it will be particularly difficult to achieve in the upcoming years: to provide our institution with the means to continue honoring its commitments, whether this be for memorial sites, medical and social institutions that support Shoah survivors, stakeholders in the fight against anti-Semitism or all those who depend on the Foundation to carry out the projects that pursue its missions."


